My dear Friends,

Glory to Jesus Christ!

Blessed Cheesefare Sunday to all of you and your loved ones! I trust that my message found everyone well and sound.

Tomorrow, we begin the Great Fast (also known as the Great Lent or simply Lent) – the fast that will last this year till April 8th inclusive followed by the Lazarus Saturday (April 1st), Palm Sunday (April 2nd), and the Holy Week (April 3rd through 8th). As we commence this holy time of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, I wholeheartedly wish everyone to have a very blessed and spiritually fruitful Lent. I hope that this fast will not be for you a pure technicality, but a time to prepare yourselves worthily, particularly through the Holy Mystery of Confession, for the celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. If I may suggest, a good practice during this Lent could be making some sacrifice(s) for the sake of peace in Ukraine and I thank you for your consideration.

As there is a tradition in our Church to ask for forgiveness before the beginning of Lent that is publicly expressed in churches through a Rite of Forgiveness, I would like to ask for your forgiveness if I ever sinned against you in any way through my thoughts, intentions, words, actions, and/or omissions.

Sadly, the situation in Ukraine still remains grave. My native land is still under a heavy attack from the side of Russia and whoever else sides with it in this horrible war... So many victims, including innocent children... How much longer will this bloodshed last? Right now, the People of Ukraine are being crucified... in fact, it is Christ Himself Who is being crucified again... Yet, life does not end with death! After the crucifixion and death comes resurrection! The resurrection will come for Ukraine as well! Our risen Lord continues to embrace all people, who grieve due to having lost their loved ones because of the war in Ukraine, asking them to have faith in Him and not be afraid, for one day they will see their loved ones again, as this is a temporary absence. Jesus is telling the whole world just as He addressed His beloved friend Lazarus' sister Martha before Christ brought Lazarus back to life: "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26 (NRSVCE)). Lord Jesus, we believe in You, give us life eternal!

This coming February 24th – one year since the beginning of the full-scale war that Russia waged against Ukraine – the war that actually began in 2014 – the entire Ukrainian Catholic Church is to observe a special day of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving that was initiated by the Head of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, His Beatitude Sviatoslav Shevchuk on behalf of the Synod of Bishops of the Ukrainian Catholic Church. As His Beatitude stated, "At this time, let us sacrifice our spiritual efforts and our prayers for the victory of the Ukrainian people in this unequal battle, as well as for our Army" (translated from the official website of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (Ukrainian version): https://ugcc.ua/data/v-ugkts-progolosheno-vsetserkovnyy-den-postu-molytvy-i-mylostyni-1949/). On this day, we'll have a Moleben to the Mother of God for Victory and Peace in Ukraine at 11 am at Holy Trinity Church (I changed the time from 9 am to 11 am; apologies for any confusion). Please join us for this special prayer for Ukraine and spread the word among others. Thank you!

In connection with this sad, above-stated anniversary of the current war in Ukraine, there will be a Moleben to the Mother of God for Victory and Peace in Ukraine held on Sunday, February 26th at 5 pm at St. Josaphat Cathedral in Parma, OH (5720 State Road). Please join us also for this special prayer service for Ukraine and spread the word among others. Thank you!

In the meantime, let us continue to *pray and act* for the end of the war in Ukraine as well as for the conversion of Ukraine's aggressors and, as a Ukrainian citizen, I'd like to tell all of you: THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF OUR SUFFER-ING BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN UKRAINE! Ukraine direly needs our help right now! If you would like to help financially your brothers and sisters in Ukraine, please see a separate notice in the bulletin of how you can help. No amount is too small, yet please be generous, and I thank you in advance for your munificence! May our Good Lord reward you manifold for it in this life and in the life to come!

You probably remember that in a couple of Sunday bulletins published towards the end of last year I put some information as per an acquaintance of mine from Berlin Center, OH, Adam Buehler, wherein he was asking for help for a Ukrainian refugee family that was coming to the United States. On February 14th I received an update from Adam via e-mail, namely that the Onyshchuk family is now in the United States and is settling down in Alliance, OH. Here is what Adam

(over)

wrote in the e-mail (I was not the only recipient); if you are able to help this family, I'd be very grateful to you for any aid that you could provide them with, especially if you could help Oleksandr to find work (I could provide you with Oleksandr's work history that was attached to the e-mail if you think that you could help him):

"Good morning All;

I need to begin this with a gracious thank you! You, and many others, have been very generous to this family and very gracious and supportive of Tammy and I as we welcomed them. Know that through your generosity of time, effort, energy, donations, money you have provided a help that was, and remains, essential and real. Thank you!

Here's the executive version, in no particular order:

The family is located in Alliance, Ohio.

The family celebrates their 1 month anniversary in the US in 9 days on FEB 23. They've been here 3 weeks.

Platon -boy, 2 years old, came to us with a fever, terrible cough and at least a double ear infection. He is strong and after an urgent care visit and antibiotics is fully recovered. Giving trouble to his parents as is standard in the 2 year old boy job description.

Zlata (girl, 8yrs) and Yunona (girl, 6 yrs) will complete their second full week of school this week. They are registered and attending Washington elementary in the Marlington school district. They return each day with the exact same big smiles that they leave each morning with.

Oleksandr (a.k.a. Sasha) Svitlana (a.k.a. sveta) are enrolled in English classes that begin on FEB 27th. They have settled into the house and are beginning to personalize it to make it their own. They have temporary work permits and we are scheduling with an immigration attorney to assist with applications for residency, long term work privileges etc.

Their European drivers licenses are valid here, temporarily, and they have already scheduled exams for Ohio drivers licenses.

They are skilled at the use of the translation apps, e mail and language conversion through WhatsApp and text messaging. They are eager for interactions.

We are focused now on stable, full time employment for Sasha and a vehicle, not necessarily in that order. Secondarily, on school clothes and warm weather clothes for the kids and, learning conversational English.

Attached is a listing of Oleksandr's work history. If you have anyone in your network that works in, or sub contracts, to the trucking, mining, excavating, manufacturing etc trades he is skilled in all manner of heavy machinery operation and maintenance. We would appreciate the opportunity to have a conversation.

FASTING & ABSTINENCE REGULATIONS FOR THE UKRAINIAN CATHOLIC CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

In accordance with statute 403 of *The Statutes of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of St. Josaphat in Parma*, "As each Christian is called to ongoing repentance and amendment of life, the ancient practice of fasting is to be maintained. All those from 14 to 59 years of age, inclusively, must abstain from meat on Holy Saturday and each and every Friday of Lent (the Great Fast), as well as Christmas Eve, December 24 and Theophany Eve, January 5. These faithful must also abstain from meat and all dairy food (including milk, eggs, cheese, etc.) on the first day of the Great Fast (the Monday which follows Cheesefare Sunday) and on Holy and Great Friday. Pregnant and nursing mothers, the ill and infirm, those who work at hard physical labor and the very poor are excused" (statute 403, *The Statutes of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of St. Josaphat in Parma*, 19 August 1994). The statute continues: "The eparch can dispense all the faithful of the eparchy as well as any individuals for a good reason from any of these fasting prescriptions. A pastor may also dispense individual parishioners for a good reason. He cannot, however, dispense the entire parish" (ibid.). Moreover, according the article 472 of the 1999 *Pastoral Guide of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States of America* (the guide that "supplements the Statutes of the Eparchy of St. Josaphat in Parma" in our eparchy (see article 4 of the *Pastoral Guide*); the guide's revised version is forthcoming), "[t]he periods of penitence and their respective duration are:

Great Lent, extending from the Monday after Cheesefare Sunday to the Saturday of Lazarus. And Great and Holy Week, extending from Great Monday to Great and Holy Saturday inclusively.

The preparation for the Birth of Jesus Christ in the Flesh (*Pylypivka*) begins on the day..." after "... the feast of St. Philip (November 15), and lasts until the Eve of the Nativity of Christ (December 24) inclusively.

The Apostles' Fast ([P]etrivka) extends from the Monday following the Sunday of All Saints, and continues through to the day preceding the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul (June 28), inclusively.

The Dormition Fast (*Spasivka*) begins on August [1] and lasts until the eve of the Dormition of the Blessed Virgin Mary (August 14), inclusively"

(article 472, Pastoral Guide of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States of America (Philadelphia, PA, 1999)).

Furthermore, the "[g]eneral rules governing abstinence [are]:

Meat is to be understood as including not only the flesh but also those parts of warm-blooded animals that cannot be melted down, e.g., the liver, lungs, blood, graves, etc. Although it is not the authentic practice of the Tradition[,] the meat of fish and crustaceans may be eaten, as well of those mammals, that live constantly in water, as, e.g., whales.

Dairy Products are to be understood as comprising products derived from mammals and birds, but not regarded as meat, e.g., cheese, lard, butter, milk, and its by-products, eggs, etc.

Fats of plant origin, e.g., those derived from olives, coconuts, seeds of the sunflower and of the pumpkin, may be used.

Voluntary penance, prayers for the intentions of the hierarchs of the Church, Bishop of Rome, the Major Archbishop, the Metropolitan, and the Eparchial Bishop; voluntary offerings to the Church, the seminaries, the Church in Ukraine, self-denial of alcohol, smoking, attendance at entertainment, etc., may be supplementary only with permission of a confessor. Bread and water alone [are] a good fast.

Priests who possess a pastoral assignment are empowered to grant dispensations or relaxation from the laws of abstinence to individual persons as well as to individual families.

The following are exempt from abstinence:

- (1) the poor who live on alms;
- (2) sick and frail persons;
- (3) convalescents who are returning to their strength;
- (4) pregnant women, and mothers who are nursing their children;
- (5) persons who perform hard labor;
- (6) children who have not completed their seventh [currently, fourteenth] year of age;
- (7) [p]ersons have completed their 59th year of age with permission of their pastor or confessor"
- (article 474, Pastoral Guide of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States of America (Philadelphia, PA, 1999)).

Furthermore, in accordance with article 475 of the *Pastoral Guide*, "In virtue of rules enacted by the Synod of Bishops under the presidency of the Major Archbishop in 1969 the following rules of abstinence oblige in the United States:


Abstinence from meat on all Fridays of the year except those which occur in privileged weeks and on holydays of Our Lord and of the Mother of God.

Abstinence from meat and all dairy products on the first day of the Great Fast (Lent) and on Good Friday.

Abstinence from meat, in addition to eating only one full meal and a smaller snack, milk products being permitted in accordance with local custom: on Christmas Eve, Epiphany Eve, Exaltation of the Holy Cross (September 14) and Beheading of St. John the Baptist (August 29).

During the Great Fast, the faithful may also maintain the tradition of abstaining from meat on Wednesdays" (ibid., article 475).

"Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean" (Mt. 8:2)

For the people of the ancient world, the most dreaded disease was undoubtedly leprosy. It was an incurable and pervasive disease that slowly spread over the body, covering it with painful, unsightly ulcers and condemning all who contracted it to horrible suffering and death. It was a merciless illness that honored no boundaries, ravaging the lives of everyone it touched: male and female, young and old, educated and illiterate, saints, and criminals, rich and poor alike. It was literally impossible to move beyond its reach.

But perhaps the most feared aspect of leprosy was that it condemned those afflicted to live out their lives in isolation, separated from normal society, from their families and friends. Because the disease was so contagious, lepers were driven out of their homes and forced to live in colonies, far from populated areas so that they could not infect anyone else. Those with leprosy truly suffered what could be termed a living death.

Because of this people were mortally afraid of lepers and strove to keep them as far away as possible. In fact, if a leper happened to encounter a healthy person at any time, he was obliged to cry out: "Unclean, keep away", in order to warn them not to approach.

Jesus must have encountered lepers many times during the course of his public life as an itinerant preacher. Fortunately for us, one of these encounters is recorded in the Gospels, and this chance meeting of Jesus with the leper holds deep meaning for us today and opens new horizons of hope and opportunities of healing.

We see that Jesus did not react like everyone else when he encountered this leper on the road. He did not turn away in fear and revulsion, he did not avoid him or ignore him as others did. Rather, he approached him, looking at him with love, treating him with the dignity of a child of God.

And the poor leper, overcome with disbelief and joy that anyone would address him in such a manner, dropped to his knees in front of Jesus and said: "Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean." And we read in the Gospel that Jesus reached out his hand and touched the man and said, "I am willing. Be clean!" (Mt. 8:3)

Is it not true, that we are very similar to this leper we see in the Gospel? Is it not true that our bodies, like his, are covered with sores, not necessarily physical sores, but wounds of the soul: sin, pride, jealousy, lust, hatred? And is it not also true that this spiritual disease has isolated us from each other and most importantly from God? Is it not true that many times, like the leper, we cry out to Jesus: "I'm unclean! Stay away! You cannot help me!?"

Thankfully, we, as a Church, are entering a special time of the liturgical year that is designed especially to help us break down the barrier that our spiritual leprosy has erected between ourselves and God: the time of Great Lent.

How? By means of the spiritual tools and treasures the Church offers us during Great Lent: the unique liturgical services that we celebrate together in our churches, a more intense personal prayer regime, fasting from that which separates us from God, good works and acts of service to our neighbor, and, above all, the Holy Mysteries of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

During Great Lent, Jesus approaches all of us who are sickened with the leprosy of sin and pride, much as he approached the leper on the road. And even though we may protest that we are unclean, that we are unworthy, or unable to change, Jesus knows differently. He knows that with but a touch of his hand, we will be healed.

As we embark upon these blessed days, we your hierarchs in the United States, impart upon you the blessings of the Holy Spirit for a fruitful and blessed Lent as we journey together towards Pascha.








Prayer Group Welcomes the Public to Pray for Ukraine
